What happens next?

Ascentis will send all results to UCAS (full diplomas only), who will then send the results to all Universities for both students who applied through Distancelearningcentre.com Ltd, as well as those who applied independently.
When certificates are sent to us by Ascentis, they will all be individually checked and sent out. Learners will receive an email from Exams notifying them when they are sent out (approx late August).

The next Moderation to take place will be in November, details of which can now be seen on the Moderation webpage which can be accessed through your Learner Account.

COURSE UPDATE

Further to our announcement in March, from September 2017 learners will be able to study an online IGCSE in Dual Science with us.

IGCSE Dual Science (4SC0): Edexcel

For this IGCSE learners sit 3 papers externally to complete the qualification. They will sit paper 1 from all three Sciences so will learn about facts, concepts and principles of Biology, Chemistry and Physics and their applications in practice. Study will include the following key areas from each Science:-





Biology

- The nature and variety of living organisms
- Structures and functions in living organisms
- Reproduction and inheritance
- Ecology and the environment
- Use of biological resources

Chemistry

- Principles of chemistry
- Chemistry of the elements
- Organic chemistry
- Physical chemistry
- Chemistry in industry



Physics

- Forces and motion
- Electricity
- Waves
- Energy resources and energy transfer
- Solids, liquids and gases
- Magnetism and electromagnetism
- Radioactivity and particles

IGCSEs are externally examined in the Summer and January each year.

We do not arrange the exams so learners will need to contact a local exam centre and pay the relevant fee for the exam direct to the centre as a private candidate*. We will, of course, give learners all the support they need in finding a suitable exam centre if they need help.

*Please note exam fees can vary.

EXTRA CURRICULUM

This month's Extra Curriculum segment is brought to you by Dominic Quaintrell, one of our Psychology tutors.

Dominic, for the past 17 years, has been teaching Air Cadets how to fly motor gliders, from an RAF Base in North East Yorkshire.

The cadets are all 16 years old and receive between 8 and 10 hours training with an instructor.

Once their accompanied instruction is complete, and if they are then up to it, the instructor gets out of the glider allowing the cadet to fly a 'circuit' of the airfield on their own.

"The opportunity to fly a glider solo is really great for the cadets. It doesn't cost them anything and it helps build their confidence. For me it is really the best 'second job' ever!" In her remaining spare time, Rebecca has taken up horse riding with her daughters, purchasing their own horse 'Indie' 18 months ago "*This was possibly a mad idea - we were complete novices and only had the slightest idea what horse ownership entailed! We have been on the steepest learning curve since, but our horsemanship and riding skills have improved massively*"

Rebecca's other favourite thing to do is walk her 3 year old Border Collie 'Pip'.







GROWTH PROJECT OPEN DAY
